Program Notes

"Symphony of Psalms" is a setting of texts from three Psalms. The work comes from Stravinsky's neoclassical period and combines traditional musical structures with experimental tonalities. The unique orchestration includes winds, piano, percussion, and lower strings. At times powerful and bold, at other times stark and austere, the work exemplifies Stravinsky's belief in clarity of expression through limited musical resources.

"Mass of the Children" combines texts from the Latin Mass with English prayers and poetry by authors such as William Blake and Thomas Ken. Rutter wrote the work because of his experiences singing with adult choirs and orchestras as a child. The work is influenced by composers such as Vaughan Williams, Faure, Lloyd-Webber, and even Stravinsky (the "Agnus Dei" in particular), while movements like the "Gloria" sound uniquely Rutter in character. The title of the concert comes from the opening line of the Rutter Mass: "Awake my soul, and with the sun Thy daily stage of duty run; Shake off dull sloth, and joyful rise to pay thy morning sacrifice." The English texts in the Mass move from joyful waking in the first movement to a prayer before sleeping in the last. We are pleased to be joined by ChildrenSong of New Jersey for this portion of our program.

About Tonight's Performers

Jason Vodicka, Music Director

Jason Vodicka is associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Rider University where he oversees the School of Communication, Media, and Performing Arts and Westminster Choir College. Known for his innovative work in the field of choral music pedagogy, Dr. Vodicka has presented at state, regional, and national conferences of the American Choral Directors Association and the National Association for Music Education. Dr. Vodicka's writing can be found in publications such as *Update: Applications of Research in Music Education, The Oxford Handbook of Choral Pedagogy, Visions of Research in Music Education,* and the *Inside the Choral Rehearsal* series. In addition to his work at Rider, Dr. Vodicka is artistic director of the New Jersey MasterChorale. He is in frequent demand as a clinician and guest conductor and has conducted festival choirs in Virginia, Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, and Mississippi.

Matthew Smith, Organist

Matt has served as the Organist at Haddonfield UMC since attaining his Master of Music degree from Princeton, New Jersey's Westminster Choir College. He was awarded First Place at the 2017 Joan Lippincott Competition for Excellence in Organ Performance and continues to perform recitals on piano and organ at various venues. Ben Shively, Assistant Conductor

Benjamin Shively is a music educator and choral conductor from Kansas City, Missouri. He holds a Bachelor of Music in Education from the University of Missouri - Kansas City Conservatory of Music & Dance. In his work as Choir Director at Rodeo Palms Junior High School in Houston, TX, Ben earned recognition as 2021-2022 Teacher of the Year on his campus. He is currently pursuing a Master of Music in Choral Conducting at Westminster Choir College, where he serves as a graduate assistant for Dr. James Jordan. Ben is a clinician, coach, and vocal instructor in the Houston area, presents at workshops and educational events, and teaches courses on various vocal and choral topics. In addition to his work with the NJ MasterChorale, Ben also serves as tenor section leader at St. Andrew Catholic Church in Newtown, PA, and maintains a small voice studio.

John T.K. Scherch, Bass

John T.K. Scherch is happy to be back with the New Jersey MasterChorale. He also performs in the choruses of Opera Philadelphia and The Philadelphia Orchestra, on the roster of Opera on Tap Philadelphia, and has appeared as a soloist with the Greater Philadelphia Choral Society and the Reading Choral Society, among others. He has also performed with D.C.'s innovative theatre company IN Series, the Friday Morning Music Club, and *Bel Cantanti Opera* in various roles ranging from Sarastro in *Mozart's Die Zauberflöte* (his most-performed role) to both a traditional performance and a critically-acclaimed hybrid staging of the *Verdi Requiem*, as well as a world premiere by Frances Pollock. Katy Akinskas, Soprano

Katy Akinskas has sung with the The Philadelphia Singers, Philadelphia Symphonic Choir, Philadelphia Chorale, Mendelssohn Club of Philadelphia, and Greater South Jersey Chorus. As a chorister she has performed with The Philadelphia Orchestra (2009-2017) and was a soloist in their 2010 *Glorious Sounds of Christmas* concert. In 2022 she sang with the Philadelphia Chorale and Grammy Award-winning vocal ensemble Chanticleer in a newly-commissioned work by composer Nico Muhly. Katy studied music education at The College of New Jersey, and has taught vocal, instrumental and classroom music since 2005. She is currently Choral Director at Eastern Regional High School in Voorhees, NJ.

New Jersey MasterChorale

The New Jersey MasterChorale is a symphonic choir comprised of 70 voices which began over 45 years ago as the Haddonfield United Methodist Church Oratorio Choir. An outreach choir of the HUMC music ministry, the NJ MasterChorale has performed major works in recent years such as Brahms's *A German Requiem*, and Haydn's *Lord Nelson Mass*, as well as annual Christmas concerts featuring a wide variety of styles. The NJ MasterChorale partners with members of the Philadelphia Orchestra, ChildrenSong of NJ, and the Holtz Handbell choir, along with other professional musicians in our area. Polly Murray, Founding Artistic Director - ChildrenSong of New Jersey

Polly Murray, an accomplished choir director and music educator, has served on the faculty of Haddonfield School District for 28 years. She founded ChildrenSong of New Jersey to provide vocal music education and performance experiences to South Jersey's young vocalists who may not have access to such opportunities in their schooling. Murray received her Bachelor of Music from Temple University, Master of Music from Northwestern University and has pursued post-graduate study at Westminster Choir College, Temple University, and the Kodaly Institute. She has directed honor choirs on the state and regional level in NJ, and most recently conducted the 2023 South Jersey Elementary Festival Chorus in March. Murray has presented music workshops nationwide and internationally, and in February 2022, presented a session on diversity, equity, and inclusion at the NJ Music Educators Conference in Atlantic City.

Nick Watts, Accompanist - ChildrenSong of New Jersey

Nick Watts was born and raised in Yorkshire, England. He went to York Minster for organ lessons at age 15, learning from John Scott Whitely, assistant organist. Following high school, Nick was awarded an organ scholarship to the Abbey School in Tewkesbury, England. Advanced studies continued at Cambridge University. After earning his Bachelor of Music degree, Nick went to Guildhall School of Music in London, where he studied piano with Norman Beadie and earned a diploma in Music Therapy. Nick came to the US in 1983 and has pursued advanced studies in music and family therapy.

ChildrenSong of New Jersey

ChildrenSong of New Jersey, founded and directed by Polly Murray, is a choral music education and performance program based in Haddonfield, NJ. Established in 2000, the program serves children ages 8 to 18, in three choirs, from Camden, Burlington, and Gloucester Counties. ChildrenSong has performed with the Philadelphia Orchestra, Symphony in C, Rowan University Concert Choir, Academy of Vocal Arts. Performance venues have included Carnegie Hall, Kimmel Center, Longwood Gardens, Washington National Cathedral, Mann Music Center, South Jersey Performing Arts Center, Atlantic City Convention Center, and Canterbury Cathedral. ChildrenSong travels on tour each year to participate in intensive vocal training sessions around the US and abroad and has produced their own seasonal CDs. Most recently, the choir sang at Radio City Music Hall, the Borgata in Atlantic City, and Christmas Village in Philadelphia, and will sing at Carnegie Hall in May.
